- The sector comprises of the following institutions:
- -Ministry of Lands, Housing and Urban Development (MoLHUD)
- -Uganda Lands Commission (ULC)
 - Lands sector is mandated to: "ensure a rational: sustainable and effective use and management of land and orderly development of urban and rural areas as well as safe, planned and adequate housing for socio-economic development".
 - The sector focuses on;
 - Sustainable Land Use, Land Tenure Security, Affordable, Decent Housing and Organized Urban Development



- ➤ Alignment of sector performance indicators to reflect performance assessment of planned activities to cater for the increase in unachieved output indicators.



5.1.Land Tenure Security







□ A balanced increase in land registration over the years is observed.


☐ There was a 0.86% increase in Land Registration from 21.14% in FY 2017/18 to 22% in FY 2018/19

Good performance was due to implementation of systematic demarcation program that increased the number of titles in the program areas.

5.2: Adequate Housing for Social Development

Dissemination of National Housing Policy



■ There was a registered increase in the level of the dissemination of the National Housing policy by Ministry of Lands Housing and Urban Development from 25% in FY2017/18 to 40% in FY2018/19.

6.2. Funding to Lands Sector (Externally Funded Projects)...cont`d

- Assessment Scope: Total of 4 loan projects were assessed on progress made as at June 2019.
- <u>Funding:</u> GoU has accumulated external funding for projects under MLHUD worth USD. 589.9 million to finance the projects.
- Funding partners: The creditor institutions for all the projects in the World Bank (IDA).
- <u>Disbursement:</u> By June 2019, the average disbursement for the 4 loans was
 43% (USD 252.5million)
- By June 2019, 1 project* worth USD. 150 million had been closed in December 31, 2018.
- An additional funding dubbed USMID-Additional Funding(USMID-AF) program has to date been extended to additional municipalities*,4 new municipalities* and Refugees hosting districts*

1.	Inadequate fund releases Projects are declared effective but take longer without disbursement	 Release approved budgets (supplementary/budget cuts) Devise revenue generation mechanisms.
2.	Delayed project disbursements affecting data provision for analysis	 ❖FastTrack disbursements for Competitive Enterprise Development Project(CEDP) ❖ and Albertine Region Sustainable Development Project(ARSDP)
3.	Slow progress on enactment of the Uganda Land Commission Law	Need for lobbying with all relevant stakeholders to push it.

NEXT STEPS

- Strengthen the role of the sector in Private sector development;
- Issues arising from land wrangles
- Duplication of titles
- > Ensuring land gazzated for industrial parks is not encroached on.
- ☐ Heavily invest in IT systems to easily check on the would be duplication of titles of ownership

- The sector through Uganda Land Commission should ensure government land is protected;
- ➤ Eg PACOB- It was noted that each MDA that owns land wants to title land on their own due to loss of trust in ULC.
- ➤ This is a huge cost to government if each MDA is allocated a separate budget to title their own land.

☐ In the next phase of planning under NDPIII, the sector should clearly map out the programs contributed to and strengthen inter and intra sectoral coordination
